Commentary

Christianity is at the roots of European civilisation as we know it. Our Europe grew out of the legacy of Rome, became Christianised, and developed in an intertwined and embedded way. The culture was Christian, as can be seen in both academic research and better quality historical fiction. Settlements, villages and towns were built around Christian activities and authority, themes and culture; the day was measured often by the Office; the Church provided what today we call services, such as medical care, education, social services; the liturgical calendar gave shape and character to the year, as well as a stream of feasts and fasts.

However, in recent times, a number of myths have also developed that science and religion, including Christianity, are incompatible. While there is some truth in some of these claims, they are often inflated, or even fictional in the main.

Commentary

The city of Ceske Budejovice was founded at the height of Christendom and thus was formed with a Christian character, which is still perceptible today in historical names, buildings, and the layout of the oldest parts of the city. Histories, such as that of St John Nepomucene Neumann's formative years in the city, show that the Christian character of the city was clear even until recent centuries. Many elements of Christianity became state-provided, such as medical care, social care, education, etc., but there are still examples of these run by the Church today. Not only is this history seen today in the names of streets, schools and building, but much of the active Christian presence in the city today is directly linked with the city's history.
